

Health Education Ministry (HEM), the Deacon's ministry on Health and Education formerly Older Adult Ministry (OAM)—will be printing articles of information in the monthly Carillion.

HEM also pays for the Carillon to be sent to the homebound members of St. John's Congregation. Today's focus is:

ADULT MEDICATIONS AND CHILDREN

Adults need to be reminded to keep their medicine out of reach of children in their families or children who visit. This applies especially to grandparents who tend to leave their medicines on their bathroom counters and forget to move them when grandchildren visit.

Far too many children die because they have somehow taken medicine meant for adults. Small children who find pills left on a counter think they are candy and will pop them into their mouths. Remember that just one pill can mean a child's death.

There are special locked boxes made to contain medicines and an-out-of reach cupboard in a bathroom or bedroom is always a good place to store medicine. Medicine should never be stored in a kitchen. Make certain that your own medicine is out of reach of children and grandchildren and spend time to teach the children in your family that another person's medicine is something that they should never take. Also teach them that medicine is made for a specific purpose and that adult medicine can be fatal to other people, but especially to children.



The Mission Committee would like to inform you of our focus for this Lenten season. This should come as no surprise since St. John's has participated in the One Great Hour of Sharing (OGHS) Special Offering for as long as I can remember. This offering has a history of over seven decades in the U.S. and includes participation of churches from many denominations. Our donations to OGHS are divided nearly equally between three programs of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.): the <u>Presbyterian Disaster Assistance</u> (PDA), the <u>Self Development of People</u> (SDOP), and the <u>Presbyterian Hunger Program</u> (PHP). These three programs all work in different ways to serve individuals and communities in need. From initial disaster response to ongoing community development, their work fits together to provide people with safety, sustenance, and hope. There is no better way than by examples to give you a sense of the powerful work that these three intertwined programs endeavor to achieve.



OUT OF CHAOS, HOPE

A key point to understand is that the PDA has existing infrastructure and partnerships in place already to be able to respond more quickly and effectively to calamity. There is hardly a more tragic current calamity than Ukraine to illustrate what PDA can do. I can't say it better than the people involved (excerpts from the PDA website):

"It is a crisis situation. People are running for their lives, and there is damage all across the country. Even people not directly impacted by the violence have lost access to water, electricity, all sorts of basic needs. PDA is working alongside partners in the region, who know how to get this work done. They know how to work with the locals so they can get the aid where it's needed. We're talking about a very large crisis, but it is in Europe. There's food in Europe. There's clothing available in Europe. We don't need to ship those things from here. They can purchase them there and they have the expertise to know how to disseminate those goods to people in the region. Our priority as PDA is to provide funding to these partners on the ground. While the scale of this crisis is new, receiving refugees from Ukraine and other countries in Central and Eastern Europe is not, which means we have trusted, established partners with the knowledge and expertise to carry out this important work."



The goals of the Presbyterian Hunger Program may be obvious, but again an example speaks louder than any other kind of entreaty to give to OGHS. Nyapan is a widowed mother of six children in South Sudan, where prevailing customs and societal traditions prevented her from inheriting her late husband's cattle. She no longer has to go to sleep hungry, thanks to a partnership between a local organization and the Presbyterian Hunger Program (PHP). Nyapan is one of 200 local women who have been trained in agricultural production and farming skills.

They receive seed and tools and have been able to establish their own farms. "There are many benefits to prioritizing women's economic empowerment," said PHP's mission specialist for International Hunger Concerns. "Climate disasters, conflicts, and of course the pandemic have stressed the global food supply and put women at greater risk of gender-based violence. Empowering women to produce their own food and earn income is essential for their resilience, adaptation and active participation in society. The capability of producing food close to home shields women from wildly fluctuating prices on the market for goods, protects women from travelling long distances in search of food, and eliminates the necessity to trade sex for food." Nyapan, who joined the program in 2021, has been diligently working the farm since then.



And finally, we come to the Self Development of People (SDOP) which may need a bit more explanation than the other two programs supported by OGHS. This program's goals are to promote justice, build stronger communities, and seek economic equity. Partnerships with local

organizations promote the empowerment of economically poor, oppressed, and disadvantaged people, and seek to change the structures that perpetuate poverty, oppression, and injustice. Again, an example—advocating for environmental justice—best highlights the work of this program. Over 40 years ago, an earthen dam of a nuclear waste disposal pond broke near Church Rock, New Mexico, and dumped tons of solid, radioactive waste and 90 million gallons of acidic and radioactive liquids into a nearby river. The resulting contamination of the land, air and ground water affected nine Navajo municipalities. The toxic and cumulative effects of this human-caused disaster have impacted the Navajo people for generations—especially in the form of chronic health problems such as asthma, and a higher incidence of miscarriages, birth defects, and liver and pancreatic cancer. Each year, hundreds of Navajo families and their allies come together near the anniversary of this tragedy to pray, to heal and to act, together. The Self Development of People program partners with a local organization that works to restore and protect the ecosystem and cultures of uranium-impacted communities of southwestern U.S. For example, they are instrumental in providing clean drinking water and in getting the Navajo Nation to pass two fundamental laws, one prohibiting new uranium mining and another prohibiting the transportation of radioactive materials across the nation.

I close with a quote from the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A). "One Great Hour of Sharing is the single, largest way that Presbyterians come together to work for a better world by advancing the causes of justice, resilience and sustainability. During Lent, we celebrate that God connects with us through Jesus' resurrection and connects us with those "who have the least"— that's how Matthew 25 puts it — and that's what One Great Hour of Sharing is all about. Thank you for your generosity! For as we always say...when we all do a little, it adds up to a lot."

St. John's Mission Committee urges you to give to OGHS as you are able throughout the Lenten season and culminating on Palm Sunday (April 10) and Easter (April 17). Thank you!


St. John's is responding to the humanitarian crisis in Ukraine by collecting monetary donations and sending it to Church World Service (CWS)

St. John's Session held its regular monthly meeting on March 22, 2022 (via Zoom) Following are some highlights from the meeting.

St. John's Session rescinded the 'Mask' mandate in the Church proper. (Masks are no longer required but are optional.) This does not apply to the Children's Center as they will institute their own requirements.

Rev. Susan Taylor, member of the Committee on Ministry, has been appointed as the Presbytery of Nevada Liaison to St. John's Session to guide the church through this transitional period of finding a pastor.

Other Options

- Dispose in permanent drop boxes in the lobbies of the Reno Police Department, Sparks Police Department, Washoe County Sheriff's Department, and the University of Nevada Reno Police Department
- Some pharmacies have permanent drop boxes.
 Talk to your pharmacist.
- If you can't get to a drop box, crush your prescriptions in a seal-tight plastic bag. Add kitty litter or wet coffee grounds. Seal bag and dispose in the trash.
